Message From Our Principal

Dear parents and guardians,

We hope that you and your families are safe and well.

Please note that in relation to Covid-19 the following measures have been implemented in our school since Monday 28th of February.

Removal of the requirement that staff and pupils wear face masks in school. (however Department guidelines are clear that if members of staff or pupils wish to continue wearing face masks or coverings, they may do so.)

Removal of the requirement to maintain children in class bubbles, each separated from the other.

Removal of the requirement for children to remain in pods within their classrooms.

Schools no longer need to request staff or pupils/students to complete a Return to Work form or a Return to School form after school holidays/breaks. Please note that infection control measures remain in place. Chief among these is staying at home if you have symptoms: the requirement to stay at home if you have symptoms remains for pupils and staff alike.

As a school community we continue to manage the risks of Covid-19.

We try to do everything practical to avoid the introduction of Covid-19 into the school. If infection is not introduced it cannot be spread.

Current infection control measures that will remain in place in schools include:

- hand washing/sanitising
- respiratory hygiene
- ventilation where required
- HEPA filter units have been installed in every classroom
- enhanced cleaning

Attendance Notes on Aladdin

Please complete any outstanding absences. Please complete reason for absence with note explaining the type of illness etc or if it recorded as "Other" please complete explanation note for this absence. If absences are in separate blocks they need to be completed separately with explanatory note of absence.

Parents/Guardians on site

Parents/guardians are not permitted on our site. Children will be supervised on the yard in the morning before school (from **08.30** to **08.50**) Boys are to stand in their line. No games/running/play time etc is permitted before school in the yard. All appointments/meetingsetc must be made through the school office.

Rainy Days

On rainy days please note that children will have to wait on yard before school starts. Please ensure that your child has rainy day dothing and that they are not waiting on yard for an excessive amount of time before school starts on bad weather days.

Walking on campus

Boys must always walk to and from their lines at the beginning and end of the school day. No running is permitted during the school line up and exit periods.

Use of bicycles and scooters

Boys must walk their bicycles and scooters on and off the school campus all the way to the entrance/exit gates of the school campus (front Church gate at the Navan road entrance / Keyhole gate at the Kinvara entrance). Boys must have a helmet, hi-vis vest and a lock.

Use of mobile phones

Boys whose parents have submitted written permission to the school for their child to have access to a mobile phone must ensure that their child only uses their phone when he is off the campus. (Boys who report to school with a phone and no written permission will have their phone confiscated and this phone must be collected from the school administration office by a parent/guardian) Boys are not allowed use their phones in the school or on school grounds. Boys must hand in their phones to their class teacher at the start of the day and they will collect them at the end of the day (the class teacher will ensure they are stored securely during the school day).

Late arrivals to the school

Boys who arrive late to school must report to the Principal's office.

School uniform


Boys who arrive in school without the full uniform must report to the Principal's office.

I would recommend this book to 8+ because it's humorous and is interesting. I recommend this book to confident readers...in other words it's really good.






Book: Harry Potter And The Philosopher's Stone














After School Clubs Return
